Christmastide

Today is the First Sunday after Christmas and we continue to worship and sing in the words and spirit of this major feast day.

The season of Christmas begins on December 24 at sunset, the beginning of the day in the Hebrew tradition. This is why churches generally have evening or midnight services for Christmas Eve. Christmas itself lasts **twelve days**.

Twelve Days of Christmas — yep, that is what the song is about. Amazon.com and other giant retailers have encouraged an erroneous assumption that the Twelve Days end on Christmas Day and must therefore begin on December 14. Not so. The Twelve Days do not come before Christmas day, they begin *on* Christmas Day, and end on January 5.

Christmastide is twelve days in which to celebrate, perhaps more reflectively than in ages past, the great gift of God that comes to us in the sweet, beguiling form of an infant.

Do this for the remembrance of me.


Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying,

Please come to the table, whether you are single, married or divorced, drinking, using or sober, abled, disabled, or ill, gay, straight, or discovering, wealthy, getting by or in debt. Christ meets us all.

We approach the altar beginning with those sitting in the last rows; they shall be first. Approach the rail from the left aisle and take a cup; used cups go on the tray on the right. You may receive only bread or only wine. Our Eucharistic bread is handmade and robust. If you prefer a wafer, please tell your server.


Receiving the bread and wine is a central act of worship in the Episcopal Church.
