The Festival Scrolls

Today is the third of a five-week Sunday series on the Festival Scrolls.

The Five Scrolls, or *Megillot* in Hebrew, are five books of the Bible that are central to Jewish holiday liturgies: Song of Songs, Ruth, Lamentations, Ecclesiastes, and Esther.

Only rarely are they preached or taught—or even read—in most of our churches. By recovering and studying them, our understanding of Scripture can be made richer and deeper. And learning more about the Jewish calendar connects to a culture that has shaped our practices and the story of our Testament. The practice of listening with an open heart and mind to voices that aren't the loudest in the crowd can help us to broaden our understanding and deepen our faith.

This study lifts up some of those voices and invites us to open our ears and minds and hearts. As we dwell in these texts consider how you can practice listening to what these texts—and other people—have to say, rather than imposing your own ideas onto them. Which marginalized voices in your life and in Scripture could you pay more attention to in the coming days?

How to read the Bible

Wouldn't you like to know some basics? But not as basic, say, as children's stories.

No, the Bible is not a children's book, and its images are often not meant for a Little Golden Book version. Scripture is often brought to life best by the artists of the world, who were often employed by patrons of the church.

Please join us for a series of discussions about how to read scripture and understand its use of plot, character, setting and patterns while also learning a little about art history and the interplay between the Bible, the church and artists. We begin at 4:00 today, and July, 21, 28 in the air-conditioned sanctuary. All are welcome.

Communion

Please come to the table, whether you are single, married or divorced, drinking, using or sober, abled, disabled, or ill, gay, straight, or discovering, wealthy, getting by or in debt. Christ meets us all.

We approach the altar beginning with those sitting in the last rows; they shall be first. Approach the rail from the left aisle and take a cup; used cups go on the tray on the right. You may receive only bread or only wine. Our Eucharistic bread is handmade and robust. If you prefer a wafer, please tell your server.

Receiving the bread and wine is a central act of worship in the Episcopal Church.


